2021 calendar, UPDATE 07 October

Penultimate Round in Brands Hatch cancelled

The FIM, RKB-F1 Motorsport regret to announce that despite the best efforts of all stakeholders involved, the two races initially scheduled to take place at Brands Hatch (GBR) on 15-17 October are now cancelled.

Following this difficult decision, the Bureau of the Circuit Racing Commission has made the decision to award double points for the final two races of the season to be held in Estoril on 29-31 October. This decision was taken in order to ensure that the continued chase for the 2021 world championship title can play out in a full and fair manner.

Furthermore, the FIM is also active and involved in the following areas: public affairs, road safety, touring and protection of the environment. The FIM was the first international sports federation to impose an Environmental Code in 1994.
